

Magnetics manufacturer breaks ground on \$506 million facility



German magnetics manufacturer eVAC broke ground on March 7,2024, in the Pocotaligo Industrial Park on a new facility that will see an investment of \$506 million and create 300 jobs.

Sumter Economic Development Board Chairman Greg Thompson welcomed the crowd and noted that years ago, the board commissioned the area "to be part of our industrial landscape."

"Because we were just as confident then as we are now, that Sumter is the ideal location for businesses to grow, thrive, and make a global difference," he said.

Sumter Rep. and Speaker of the House Murrell Smith brought greetings on behalf fellow Legislative Delegation members, who are in session at the Statehouse.



"But this is such a big day and a momentous day for our community, I wanted to make sure I was present, and I'm honored to be here," he said.

The groundbreaking is a testament to the state's economic development efforts, he said, "and the reason is, South Carolina is a great place to do business."

Library offers wide range of programs

Once a month, the Sumter County Library goes to the dogs.

Therapy dogs, that is.

Every second Saturday from 11 a.m. to Noon at the Main Branch in Downtown Sumter, a program known as 'Read to Me' takes place. Anyone and everyone can come read to a certified therapy dog, enjoy their companionship, or take them for a walk in the children's area.

It's one of many programs offered by the Sumter County Library in addition to the tradition of borrowing books. Patrons can use computers, access wi-fi for their own devices, use study rooms, download ebooks, play with STEM toys, make crafts, enjoy an adult coloring class, come watch a movie, join a book club for monthly discussions, or check out a State Park Pass.

"We have a lot to offer our residents and we want people to know what programs and services we offer," said Sumter County Library Director Robert Harden. "The therapy dogs have been very well received."

The Read to Me program was started by Dennie Sides, no stranger to this world, having first got involved in 2004 with Paws for Friendship Inc., a Nebraska-based non-profit organization. He has a pair of therapy Schnauzers, Skipper and Sparky.

"I enjoy seeing the smiles on people's faces," he said. "I enjoy the people."

Sides recalled pre-pandemic visits to an elementary



school where a non-verbal student read with Sparky for five or six weeks.

"And pretty soon he started communicating with the other kids. And there was another boy who wouldn't go to speech class unless Sparky would go with him. He laid on the floor and used Sparky as a pillow," Sides said, laughing. "Those are the things I enjoy and they make me keep coming back."

Harden said he's watched the scope of the Library continue to develop to meet the needs of the community.

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Emergency Management earns award

Sumter County received an Outstanding Safety Achievement Award from the SC Counties Insurance Trusts for its use of a mobile app that helps county employees quickly notify first responders in case of emergencies.

"This is a great example of Sumter County's commitment to improving the safety and security of its employees and citizens," said Robert Benfield, director of Insurance Services for the South Carolina Association of Counties (SCAC). "Our annual Safety Awards spotlight those projects and dedicated county employees who often work behind the scenes to mitigate potential losses and minimize the impact of unforeseen events, and we are pleased to spotlight Sumter County for its leadership and dedication."

Sumter County recently implemented the Rave Panic app, which allows county employees to activate a "panic button" via their mobile phone or computer in the event of an emergency. The application notifies emergency services and law enforcement to send proper authorities to the scene and informs other county employees of the situation.

The Rave Panic app has been added to county computers, and employees were given the opportunity to download the app to their mobile devices at no personal expense. The app can also be used to send notifications to county employees for other emergency scenarios or if county offices were to close unexpectedly.

SCAC this year honored 14 counties for innovative programs and protocols used to keep county residents and employees safe.

"These initiatives are often unseen and unsung, so we're excited to shine a light on the important work being done in our counties," Benfield said. Awards are given each year to counties who have made significant achievements in their risk management and safety programs.

said when scouting locations, eVAC "saw tremendous opportunity in Sumter County."

"Local, state and federal support, and coupled with a very skilled and available workforce, this made Sumter County stand out," she said.

Dr. Erik Eschen, CEO of VAC Group, joked that for a groundbreaking, "the lucky ones do the speeches, the not-so-lucky- ones have to listen to our speeches."

Today represents "a very special moment in a long journey ... going from paper and planning to realization," he said.

Three years ago a small contingent from his company flew to Detroit and met with General Motors.

"They want to do something big with us," he was told, and what followed were in-depth negotiations.

Eschen gave credit to the company's founders, who started the business over 100 years ago, which led to the innovative technology of permanent magnets today.

We are only part of a long journey here, as well. We are standing on the shoulders of giants, and I'm very honored," he said.

They're very proud to be "a great partner and part of Team Sumter," he told the crowd. "Being in the County, being in the community is just outstanding."

Sumter County Council Chairman James T. McCain Jr. said we're experiencing another great day "because today signifies progress. There is no substitute for hard work and I'm proud to be part of Team Sumter as we break ground on our newest partner in this growing community."

One of his favorite aspects of serving as Chairman of



County Council is welcoming new industry and watching existing industry grow.

"We're very excited to see eVAC embark on this journey and we humbly offer our support as you build a world class facility which will make all of us very proud," he said. "This is a huge win not just for Sumter but for the state of South Carolina. Well done."

Sumter Mayor David Merchant stressed the importance of teamwork and partnerships as the City, County and Legislative Delegation work together toward a common goal.

"That Team Sumter thing that we all hear and say all the time is real and we appreciate that," he said.

"It's not just offering the computers with internet access, but library staff helping patrons navigate online job applications, find the site they need, or helping patrons with their personal devices, be it their tablet or downloading the app for our E-book collection. Fax and printing services are available for a fee."

Library staffers routinely take part in literacy events at Sumter schools and other venues as well. "Outreach services are important to let people know what the library offers. We also do library tours, and our annual

summer reading program is coming up and our teens," he said.

A new bookmobile took to the road last summer thanks to donations from the Williams-**Brice-Edwards** Charitable Trust, Sumter County Government, Charles E. Fienning and the Friends of the Sumter County Library. Two local young readers – Clara Jane Zimpleman and Lynzie Hodge – also gave donations.

"Jonathan Courson is head of Bookmobile Services, Brendan Thomas is his assistant and they go out on regular stops around the county," he said. "They also go to schools for reading events and help in getting the word out about what programs and services we offer."
